Course Grants for 2024-2025 (Fall 2024, Winter 2025, Spring 2025)

Call for Proposals: Collections-Based Courses

DEADLINE FOR SUBMISSION: January 8, 2024 **AWARD NOTIFICATION:** February 6, 2024

The mission of the College of Arts and Sciences' Interdisciplinary Humanities Research Center (IHRC) is to strengthen faculty research and creative activity while also enhancing its integration into the curriculum; support initiatives involving multidisciplinary research teams, both within the university as well as with external partners; and foster intellectual community and public engagement.

The IHRC has been an incubator for curriculum innovation and public humanities outreach since its establishment in 2009, providing seed grants to support interdisciplinary team-teaching as well as collaborative multidisciplinary projects resulting in the establishment of new undergraduate minors (e.g. Environmental Humanities, Game Studies, the redesign of the Disability Studies minor), and inter-arts collaborations supporting scholarship, performances, and exhibitions as well as K12 outreach. IHRC Grants for 2024-2025: Collections-Based Courses

The IHRC supports the development of courses that imagine creative use of "collections" and how such are defined/demarcated, collected, and supported. How and when does accumulation accrue value, become a "collection" that endures, shaping knowledge and perspectives?

Projects may wish to engage documentary concepts (e.g., custody, collection development, arrangement, description, organization, representation, and naming), as well as matters of ownership, social justice, preservation, reuse, and sustainability. Projects might elect to engage community-centric histories and participatory approaches to archival practices. Proposals may reimagine notions of "collection" within the broad scope of material culture, as well as develop new "collections" from stories, recipes, data, and other "stuff" within and outside of traditional institutions.

Projects may use institutional collections at the University of Delaware or from local or regional institutions and organizations. Especially encouraged are projects that help forge sustainable collaborations with outside experts, curators, librarians, archivists, and community stakeholders or seek to bridge communications with K-12 networks.

Designed for graduate and undergraduate students, previous collections-based course grants have been used to promote and bring visibility to Black and African Diaspora print and material culture, the production and circulation of South American textiles, and the creation of digital archives of community-based arts. Others have focused on documentary photography, oral

histories, and <u>digital storytelling</u> of community stories. All have provided rich opportunities for hands-on experience and public-facing student learning.

Humanities and collections projects should:

- Offer students opportunities to participate in collaborative collections-based research projects as they also develop the public and digital humanities skills that are in high demand within the academy and transferable to a broader range of careers involving humanities research, education, and advocacy;
- Enable faculty to partner effectively and substantially with archives, library, and museum professionals, within and beyond the university, in the delivery of innovative collections-based courses; or
- Enable faculty to work toward the development of new "collections" as pedagogical and public-facing objectives.

Proposed projects should:

- Be designed to engage the humanities;
- Be designed for instruction at the graduate or undergraduate course level;
- Create multidisciplinary learning opportunities for students;
- Enable students to gain first-hand, practical experience with archival and curatorial processes and their varied communication forms (e.g., physical exhibitions, curated media lounges, reading rooms and/or digital platforms and virtual forums).

Especially welcome are proposals that:

- Focus deeply on materials UD Library's Department of Special Collections and Museums; or
- Involve inter-institutional partnerships with museums, libraries, archives, or collections in the region; or
- Help forge sustainable collaborations with outside experts and community stakeholders.

Allowable costs for IHRC funding include:

- Honoraria for external collaborators (museum and library professionals whose job responsibilities do NOT include teaching or supervising UD student researchers).
- Honoraria for external specialists (non-UD faculty collaborators, artists, invited speakers, community partners or research participants).
- Student/faculty field trips that are grant project related (e.g., transportation expenses).
- Limited expenses for teaching materials for supplementary activities or research related to the project and student engagement.
- Specialized workshops for collaborating faculty and students.

Departmental in-kind cost-share support is required for:

- Support for the proposal from department/unit chair(s). Please share draft CFP with your chair or program directors or sponsoring units.
- On-load assignment of faculty to teach the proposed graduate or undergraduate course in Fall 2024, Winter 2025, or Spring 2025.
- Administrative support for faculty grant expenditures and financial reporting.

Maximum award amount: \$5,000. Grant expenditures are reimbursed by the IHRC.

- Grant recipients must submit a final project report suitable for archiving/publication on the IHRC website by June 15, 2025. Funds must be spent by June 1, 2025; a full accounting of expenditures is to be included in the final project report.
- Grant recipients will be asked to share highlights from their project at a future IHRC workshop and/or IHRC grant showcase.
